Niagara County Legislator Irene Myers announced Windsong Radiology will bring its mobile 3-D screening mammography unit to Ransomville on Saturday, June 12.

"I am very happy to welcome back the Windsong mobile mammogram unit to our community to provide mammogram screenings," she said. "The fact is too many of our residents do not get the preventative health care services they need and one reason for that is accessibility. That is why we bring this unit right to our backyard."

The screening will take place from 8-11:30 a.m. Saturday, June 12, at the Ransomville Fire Co., 2521 Youngstown Lockport Road. One must schedule an appointment with Windsong prior to the event. There are a limited number of appointments.

"I hope those who have been putting off getting a mammogram will attend this event," Myers said. "I know from my own personal experience that early detection is key so make your appointment."

Morreale, Jacoby seek reelection to Lewiston Town Board

Incumbent Town of Lewiston councilmen Rob Morreale (shown right) and John Jacoby have announced their bid for reelection to the Town of Lewiston Town Board.

Morreale, having previously served a four-year term, was appointed earlier this year to fill a vacancy created when Al Bax resigned to become the town attorney. Jacoby is completing his first four-year term this year.

The reelection announcement marks an unusual occurrence for the two board candidates in that Jacoby, a Democrat and Morreale, a Republican, are running in a joint campaign.

"Rob was the person who originally recruited me to run and I am delighted to have the opportunity to campaign with him" Jacoby said. "I have worked side by side with Rob and he is a tireless champion for the residents and business owners of the Town of Lewiston."

Morreale explained, "I have known John for about 40 years and watched his steady climb through the ranks of the Niagara Falls Fire Department. I was certain he would bring a wealth of experience to the board and that did indeed prove to be true."

The two note with pride that neither has ever missed a Lewis-



ton Town Board regular meeting or work session. Jacoby said he patterned his attendance on Morreale's perfect record.

"You can't be effective if you are not here," Jacoby quipped. "Rob set the bar and I believe it is the foundation of good service to our community."

Morreale said, "When we walk through the doors of Town Hall, we leave our political hats at the door. We are interested in moving the town forward and keeping a close watch on spending."

Morreale has been endorsed by the Republican and Conservative parties, while Jacoby has the Democratic, Working Families and Conservative endorsements. Both men expressed their appreciation for the approval of their candidates.

"The final and most important stamp of approval comes from the voters themselves on election day," they said. "We hope the voters recognize our commitment to the Town of Lewiston this year and give us their support."

Cuomo lifts indoor dining curfew

Gov. Andrew Cuomo released the following statement on Monday: "During the month of May, we took major steps towards re-opening our economy and, as of May 31, we are lifting the midnight curfew on indoor dining for bars and restaurants across New York."

"Like every other milestone of our reopening, the end of curfew for indoor dining is the result of New Yorkers banding together, practicing safety precautions and getting vaccinated, so we can defeat the virus and work our way towards a new normal."

"Our reopening approach has always been data-based and, if we

want to stay on our current trajectory, we need to remain vigilant across the board - especially when it comes to indoor activities. As always, we will continue to work with our local partners to make sure venues are following basic safety guidelines."
